Polyp Palace to be Featured at the Essex County Fair



Warren County Public Health is loaning their "Colon Cave" to ECHD for display at the Essex County Fair this year from August 13-17. The 10-foot tall, 20-foot long walk through inflatable replica of the human colon comes equipped with examples of the maladies that can afflict the colon. Visitors can pass through it to learn more about the progression from polyps to the different stages of colon cancer, as well as diverticulitis and more.

This endeavor dovetails nicely with ECHD's "45 is the New 50" campaign where we have promoted awareness around the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommendation that Colon Cancer screening now begin at age 45 for those with average risk.



Additional Rabies Bait Drops Planned for Week of Aug 6-12



Following a spring rabies bait drop campaign from May 5 - 10 that covered a similar geographical area, the USDA APHIS Wildlife Services announced additional bait drops planned for the week of Aug 6 – 12.

Wildlife Services in cooperation with multiple states will distribute the **ONRAB bait-drop** vaccine in the Champlain Valley of Essex County as part of an ongoing field evaluation of the its effectiveness to control rabies in raccoons and skunks.

This year’s field assessment is part of a multi-year study addressing operational questions related to bait density, flight line spacing, and effectiveness. The first U.S. field trial with ONRAB took place in West Virginia during 2011 and was expanded

between 2012-2020 to include strategic areas in Ohio, New York, Vermont, and New Hampshire.

- Oral rabies vaccination has been conducted in New York since 1995.
- **Oral Rabies Vaccination (ORV) baiting** occurs in three geographic regions of New York – the Saint Lawrence Valley Region in the northern part of the state; the Champlain Valley in northeastern New York; and the Buffalo-Niagara Region of Western New York.
- From approximately August 6-12, 867,600 ONRAB baits will be distributed across the Champlain Valley in northeastern New York, northern Vermont and northern New Hampshire by fixed wing aircraft, **including 37,000 baits in Clinton and Essex Counties, NY (Figure above).**
- If you find a bait, leave it undisturbed where you found it unless it is on your lawn, driveway, or other area unlikely to attract raccoons and other wildlife. Wear gloves if you move the bait to an area of thicker cover where raccoons are more likely to find it.
- Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water after contact with baits. An intact bait poses no risk. If the blister packet containing the vaccine breaks the liquid vaccine should be visible. Use gloves to place the bait in a plastic bag. Cover the bait with 1:10 dilution of household bleach and wipe down affected areas with bleach solution. Place cleaning materials in a bag and dispose of the bag in regular garbage.
- Vaccination of domestic pets and livestock remains critical to prevent rabies.

CHA/CHIP Progress Updates & Special Reports – After a highly successful effort to reconvene community partners and organizations around community health planning in June, ECHD and hospital partner UVMHN-ECH plan to launch the **Community Health Coalition of Essex County** in September. The mission and objectives of this coalition will be determined by members, but one overarching goal for the group is to define health priorities that can be advanced by the collective, using data and shared knowledge about what drives health outcomes in Essex County. Root cause analyses increasingly point to social needs (also known as social determinants of health) as factors contributing disproportionately to certain health behaviors and poorer health outcomes. With social needs being a major driver of health, the entire health system – healthcare and public health – need to look to non-traditional partners to develop approaches that encourage the consideration of health impacts during policy setting activities.



Patient Admissions

Patients were admitted to our services for a variety of complex medical conditions including:

Neurological Conditions

- **Stroke:** A sudden interruption of blood flow to the brain, causing brain damage, loss of function, or paralysis.
- **Encephalopathy:** A broad term for brain dysfunction caused by various such as infections, toxins, or liver failure.
- **Cerebral Palsy:** A neurological disorder affecting movement, muscle tone, and posture, often from birth.
- **Parkinson's Disease:** A progressive nervous system disorder that affects movement and can cause tremors and stiffness.
- **Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS):** A progressive neurodegenerative disease affecting nerve cells that control voluntary muscles.
- **Spinal Stenosis:** Narrowing of the spinal canal, often causing pain, numbness, or weakness in the back and legs.

Cardiovascular Conditions

- **Atrial Fibrillation and Heart Disease:** A heart rhythm disorder that increases the risk of stroke and other heart-related complications.
- **Heart Failure:** A chronic condition where the heart doesn't pump blood as effectively as it should be.
- **Carotid Artery Obstruction:** Narrowing or blockage of the carotid arteries, increasing risk of stroke.
- **Embolism:** A blockage in an artery, often caused by a blood clot that has traveled from another part of the body.

- **Venous Hypertension:** High pressure in the veins, often due to valve dysfunction or blockage, leading to swelling or ulcers.

Respiratory Conditions

- **Pulmonary Fibrosis:** Scarring of the lung tissue that leads to severe breathing difficulties.
- **Respiratory Failure:** A life-threatening condition where the lungs can't provide enough oxygen or remove enough carbon dioxide.
- **Pneumonia:** Infection that inflames the air sacs in or both lungs, which may fill with fluid.
- **Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD):** A group of lung diseases that block airflow and make breathing difficult.

Digestive and Genitourinary Conditions

- **Paralytic Ileus, Gastroenteritis, and Colitis:** Conditions that affect the intestines, often causing pain, bloating, nausea, or diarrhea.
- **Surgical Aftercare:** Post-operative care for surgeries involving the digestive tract, genitourinary system, joints, spine, circulatory system, or amputations.
- **Obstructed Bile Duct:** Blockage of the bile ducts, which can lead to infection, jaundice, or liver damage.
- **Cancer of the Stomach:** A malignant tumor in the stomach lining, often requiring surgery, chemotherapy, or palliative care.

Renal and Metabolic Conditions

- **Kidney Disease:** A progressive loss of kidney function, which can lead to kidney failure.
- **Diabetes:** A metabolic disorder characterized by high blood sugar levels that can damage various organs and systems.

Musculoskeletal and Injury-Related Conditions

- **Fractures:** Broken bones requiring rehabilitation and support to regain mobility.
- **Pressure Ulcers and Wounds:** Skin injuries often caused by prolonged pressure, common in patients with limited mobility.
- **Orthopedic and Joint Replacement Surgery Recovery:** Rehabilitation and support following procedures such as knee, hip, or shoulder replacements.

Infectious and Immune-Related Conditions

- **Infection:** Various infections requiring monitoring, wound care, or IV antibiotic therapy.
- **Shingles:** A viral infection causing a painful rash, typically in older adults or those with weakened immune systems.




Mental Health

- **Bipolar Disorder:** A mental health condition characterized by extreme mood swings, including episodes of mania and depression.



Excessive alcohol consumption by adults

Excessive alcohol use is an important public health concern in New York, with one in five adults reporting binge or heavy drinking. This contributes to injuries and chronic diseases. Nearly 90% of addictions begin before age 18, and alcohol is often a gateway drug to other substance misuse. Essex County has high rates of alcohol consumption, retailer density and associated chronic disease.




In January 2025, U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy issued an advisory linking alcohol consumption directly to increased cancer risk. Alcohol is the third leading preventable cause of cancer in the U.S., behind tobacco and obesity, yet fewer than half of Americans recognize this risk. This connection is well-established for at least seven cancer types, including breast cancer (16.4% of cases attributable to alcohol), regardless of the type of alcohol consumed.

Colorectal Cancer Screening Rate


Percentage of adults aged 50-74 receiving breast cancer screening based on recent guidelines, 2018

The density of alcohol retail outlets (establishments licensed to sell alcohol) in an area impacts drinking patterns and associated harms. These include on-premises (e.g., bars, restaurants) and off-premises (e.g., liquor stores, grocery stores) locations. Measuring outlet density helps monitor alcohol availability and informs strategies to reduce excessive drinking and its harms.







Identifying August 31as International Overdose Awareness Day (IOAD) and that this year, Governor Kathy Hochul, through legislative action, proclaimed Overdose Awareness Day in the State of New York and

WHEREAS, Overdose Awareness Day aims to raise awareness of overdose, reduce the stigma of drug-related deaths, and is an opportunity to stimulate discussion about evidence-based overdose prevention and drug policy; and

WHEREAS, Overdose Awareness Day also acknowledges the grief felt by families and friends whose loved-ones have died or suffered from a drug overdose, and spreads the message that drug overdose is preventable; and

WHEREAS, The goals of Overdose Awareness Day are to:

- provide an opportunity for people to mourn loved ones without shame;
- provide community members information about the issue of fatal and non-fatal overdose;
- send a strong message to current and former people who use drugs that they are valued;
- encourage ongoing discussion about overdose prevention and drug policy, interventions; and support services; &
- ultimately prevent and reduce drug-related harm by supporting evidence-based policy and practices and
